PREFACE

The Metropolitan Council's 2030 Regional Parks Policy Plan as adopted on June 29, 2005, identified Tony Schmidt Park as a regional park addition to the regional park system. Ramsey County began acquiring land for the park in 1958 as one of several lake front County parks that provided facilities for swimming, picnicking and boating. Over the years, the park area was expanded to 217 acres. In 1998, the County began a phased redevelopment of the park, financed primarily through County general obligation bonds. Recent improvements to the park include new entry roads, parking lots, boat launch, swimming beach, paved trails, play areas, picnic shelters, gazebo and associated site amenities. The park has a long history of serving the region, as verified by park user origin studies conducted in 2004.

I. BOUNDARIES AND ACQUISITION

Tony Schmidt Regional Park is located in northwestern Ramsey County in the City of Arden Hills. The park is generally bounded by Lake Johanna and County Road E on the south, Snelling Avenue on the east, County Road F on the North, and I-35W and New Brighton Road on the west. The park currently encompasses 217.28 acres. The Boundaries and Acquisition Map (Page 2) identifies properties to be incorporated into the park. Two additional parcels (#1 and #2 on the Boundaries and Acquisition Map) will add 4.61 acres, bringing the total park acreage within the park boundary to 221.89. Additional areas owned by the City of Arden Hills, Mounds View School District and Ramsey County Libraries (parcels #3, #4 and #5 on the Boundaries and Acquisition Map) will be traversed to accommodate proposed trail connections. Trail connections through these properties will be formalized with intergovernmental cooperative agreements. The entities who own these parcels have been involved in the master plan formulation and are conceptually supportive of the trail connections.

Note: Based on Ramsey County Board policy, acquisition of parcels #1 and #2 will be on a “willing seller” basis, while owned by the current property owner.


INTERGOVERNMENTAL COOPERATIVE AGREEMENTS

Parcel #3 – The Ramsey County Arden Hills Library is located where a proposed trail will cross in order to complete the west trail north of County Road E-2. Ramsey County Libraries has conceptually agreed to allow a trail across a portion the library site. Ramsey County Libraries has been evaluating alternative library sites that could result in relocation of the library. If the site is vacated in the future, a trail easement will be secured to assure perpetual trail access.

Parcel #4 – This is part of the City of Arden Hills Perry Park. Through agreement, the City will allow Ramsey County to construct a corridor trail across that portion of the park lying easterly of the wetland. The corridor trail will be located on an existing utility road. The City will be permitted to make local trail connections to the corridor trail in order to facilitate access from adjacent neighborhoods and parks. The master plan identifies a trail connection to the active use areas of Perry Park.

Parcel #5 – This site is part of the Mounds View Senior High School property. An agreement will be negotiated with the Mounds View School District to allow Ramsey County to construct a trail across a portion of the school property in order to complete the park trail system. The trail will provide benefit to the school by providing walking/ bike access to the school as well as cross-country running and skiing for school teams

II. STEWARDSHIP PLAN

Much of the park is currently developed for recreational use. The majority of the undeveloped areas are wetland. Other undeveloped areas are managed as natural areas, with opportunities for trail access.

The St. Paul and Ramsey County Public Health Department operates one of its yard waste sites in the western part of the park (see Conflicts map, page 10). This is an interim use until such time as that part of the park is developed. Development of that area of the park will not occur until parcel #1 is acquired. No revenue is derived from this use; however, the St. Paul and Ramsey County's Public Health Department, which manages the site, finances all recycling and solid waste removal services for the Parks and Recreation Department.

III. DEMAND FORECAST

The service area of the park includes the northwestern part of Ramsey County (Arden Hills, New Brighton, Mounds View, Shoreview and Roseville). Northeastern Hennepin County (St. Anthony, and northeast Minneapolis) and southern Anoka County (Columbia Heights and Fridley).

The 2005 Regional Park Visit Estimate Report found that the park had 287,300 visitors that year. Fifty-one percent of the park's use is from people who live outside of greater Ramsey County as determined by a 2004 survey.

After completion of the beach, picnic areas and boat access in 2000, the greatest demand for the park is completion of the trail system. A significant increase in trail use is anticipated as the trail system will have connections to residential neighborhoods, two schools, a city park, library and college, as well as providing trail experiences for park visitors. Based on 2005 regional park visits for regional trails in Ramsey County, it is anticipated that these trails will serve an additional 75,000 – 100,000 visitors per year.


IV. DEVELOPMENT CONCEPT

Tony Schmidt Regional Park includes ¼ mile of shoreline on the north side of Lake Johanna, a 230-acre lake. A wetland corridor follows the drainage way from Lake Johanna northwestward to Long Lake. These wetlands are surrounded by steep wooded hills. Ramsey County has operated a swimming beach, boat launch and picnic area on the north side of Lake Johanna since the original 34-acre property was acquired as a county park in 1958. Additional acreage was acquired with County funds in the 1970s, bringing the total acreage up to the present 217.28 acres. The additional acreage provides opportunities for an excellent trail system that enables connection to neighborhoods, schools, city parks and library.

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In 1998, Ramsey County undertook an extensive planning process with a Citizens' Task Force appointed by the Ramsey County Board of Commissioners and the Arden Hills City Council to prepare a master plan for Tony Schmidt County Park. The Citizens' Task Force included a broad spectrum of people including representatives from the neighborhood, the City of Arden Hills Planning and Parks and Trails commission, School District, as well as Ramsey County at large. The master plan was approved by the City of Arden Hills City Council and the Ramsey County Board of Commissioners in 1998. Attached as Exhibit I are graphic excerpts from the approved master plan. The regional park master plan development concept incorporates the elements of the 1998 master plan.

In 2000, the first phase of that plan was implemented with redevelopment of the swimming beach (with beach building), boat launch, picnic area (with two shelters and gazebo), playground area and associated roads and parking lots.

Paved trails including a “safe island” crosswalk on Lake Johanna Boulevard, were added in the redeveloped area. Ramsey County funded the development in the amount of \$2,000,000, through the County’s Capital Improvement Program (CIP) financed by general obligation bonds. In addition, the State Outdoor Recreation Grant Programs provided \$250,000 for these improvements.

In addition to the facilities constructed in 2000, the main emphasis of the 1998 master plan was an extensive trail system, including a corridor trail between Lake Johanna Boulevard and County Road E-2. The majority of that trail system remains to be developed; however, in 2006, the trail underpass under the Canadian Pacific Railroad and connecting trails were installed. The Ramsey County CIP funded this \$292,500 project along with a contribution of \$32,500 from the City of Arden Hills. This underpass was key to completion of the trail system connecting north and south segments of the park.

The development concept in this regional park master plan (see Development Concept Map) is consistent with the 1998 master plan. Completion of the trail system will be the focus of future development. The table below summarizes the existing and proposed trail lengths. A future trail connection to Long Lake Regional Park one-half mile away is planned.



The future recreation development area in the southwest corner of the park is a lower priority. The residential in-holding (Parcel #1) will have to be acquired and the yard waste site relocated before this area is available for development. Recreational development in this area will include a group picnic area, disk golf, winter sledding and day camp.

V. CONFLICTS

Conflicts are shown on the enclosed map (page 10). The conflicts include two large overhead electric power lines, for which Xcel Energy holds easements. Neither is a physical impediment, however, they are highly visible from a portion of the park. Relocation is not feasible.

Two at-grade street crossings are necessary for the trail system. The one on Lake Johanna Boulevard was addressed in the 2000 redevelopment by adding a center “safety island” and visually identifying the crosswalk. The County Road E-2 crossing will be evaluated/ designed when the trail is constructed in this location.

The Canadian Pacific Railroad presented a significant barrier separating the north and south parts of the park. The installation of the trail underpass in 2006 eliminated this barrier for trail connections to the north. However, the raised railroad grade still presents a visual barrier for views along the wetland corridor extending northwesterly from Lake Johanna.

The Ramsey County yard waste site is a conflict in the sense that it is not a recreational use. However, there is no actual conflict in that there is no current recreational use in this area of the park and the site will be relocated when recreational development occurs; and, relocation will be worked out between the departments of Public Health and Parks and Recreation and the City of Arden Hills.



VI. PUBLIC SERVICES

All public services, i.e., roads, sewers, water, electric are in place to provide for the development proposed in this Master Plan.

VII. OPERATIONS

The Ramsey County Board of Commissioners has adopted an “Ordinance for Control and Management of Open Space Areas and Facilities Under the Jurisdiction of the Board of Ramsey County Commissioners.” The Ordinance shall govern the conduct of the public during use of the regional park, its facilities and resources.

The operation and maintenance of the regional park will be the responsibility of the Ramsey County Parks and Recreation Department. Operation and maintenance services will be provided at a level that is appropriate for the designated use and consistent with the current level of development.

1. Operation Responsibilities – provision of personnel and equipment necessary or incidental to serve park users and implement resource management activities and outdoor recreation programs.

The following operational services will be provided by Ramsey County:

- a. Access Control – The Ramsey County Sheriff will be responsible for enforcement of park hours as stated in the ordinance. (One-half hour before sunrise to one-half hour after sunset).
 - b. Park Site (general) – The Ramsey County Parks and Recreation Department will provide first aid, lifeguard services and security throughout all areas of the park. Ramsey County will provide Ordinance enforcement and general police services through its Sheriff’s Department. Park Department personnel will supplement the regular Sheriff’s Department patrol to help educate and direct the public in the appropriate uses of the park.
2. Maintenance responsibilities – The Ramsey County Parks and Recreation Department will provide of personnel, materials and equipment necessary or incidental to the maintenance of resources, structures and facilities of the regional park. This includes regular and routine maintenance, as well as life cycle maintenance. Specific regular and routine maintenance includes:
 - a. Tree maintenance (includes diseased tree control)
 - b. Turf maintenance
 - c. Litter pick-up and disposal
 - d. Pavement sweeping and repair (includes parking lots and paved trails)
 - e. Snow plowing (includes parking lots and trails)
 - f. Beach life guard services
 - g. Site furnishings (picnic tables, grills)

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- h. Sign maintenance
- i. Natural resource management
- j. Playground inspection and repair
- k. Boat launch
- l. Buildings repair; beach, picnic shelters, restrooms and gazebo

Operations and Maintenance Funds

Funding for regular and routine maintenance and operations of the park is appropriated from County tax revenue supplemented by regional operation and maintenance funds. Life cycle maintenance is implemented according to the County's Capital Asset Management Plan. Regional Park elements of this plan are financed with State appropriations through the lottery in lieu of a sales tax portion of the Regional Park Operations and Maintenance Program. Ramsey County manages these funds in a Regional Park and Trail Rehabilitation Account.

Park Fees

By Ramsey County policy, there are no user fees for general use of the park and facilities. There is a fee for rental of the picnic shelter and pavilion. Food and beverage items are available from vending machines located in the beach building. Revenues from these activities help fund park operations.

Water Quality Monitoring

The County performs weekly water quality sampling at the beach area throughout the beach season. A protocol has been established for follow-up monitoring and beach closure/opening based on pre-established thresholds for water quality indicators.

Safety

1. Police – The Ramsey County Sheriff’s Department provides the necessary police service (i.e., law enforcement, security, facility lock-up and first aid for park safety).
2. Fire – The Lake Johanna Fire Department provides the necessary fire protection services for the park.
3. Ambulance – Emergency ambulance service, when needed, are dispatched by the Ramsey County Sheriff’s Department.

Disease Control

1. Human and Animal - Ramsey County and the City of Arden Hills have responsibilities for human and animal disease control. The St. Paul and Ramsey County Public Health Department will have the primary responsibility for human as well as animal health problems. The City will continue to provide the services in animal control that they presently provide.
2. Plant Disease Control – the Ramsey County Parks and Recreation Department will be responsible for plant disease control (i.e., Dutch elm and oak wilt disease) and noxious weed control.

VIII. CITIZEN PARTICIPATION

Extensive citizen participation took place when the 1998 county park master plan was prepared for this park. All major elements of the county park master plan have been incorporated into the regional park master plan. This regional park Master Plan was reviewed and recommended for approval by the Ramsey County Parks and Recreation Commission and the Arden Hills Trails, Parks and Recreation Commission. The Master Plan was approved by the City of Arden Hills City Council and the Ramsey County Board of Commissioners.

IX. PUBLIC AWARENESS

This park has been operated as a County Park for nearly 50 years. Patrons have been attracted to the area for boating, fishing, swimming and picnicking. User surveys show that it has a regional draw. The name will be changed from “county” to “regional” on signs, brochures and the County’s web site. The park is the venue for the City of Arden Hills annual community celebration, is the host site for YMCA day camps and a number of other special events.

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X. SPECIAL NEEDS

All facilities will be developed with accessibility in accordance with Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) requirements.


XI. NATURAL RESOURCES

Natural Resources Inventory

The Minnesota Land Cover Classification System (MLCCS) inventory was conducted in 2005 by the Rice Creek Watershed District. The entire park is within the Rice Creek Watershed District. The inventory showed a highly altered upland habitat and relatively low diversity wetlands. The map on page 15 identifies each of the MLCCS coverage areas within Tony Schmidt Regional Park. Please refer to the reference number (C Num) illustrating the following areas:

Habitat/Vegetation Management

The natural vegetation of Tony Schmidt Regional Park was oak woods, scattered savannas and extensive wetlands. Much of the natural habitat is highly degraded. Invasive species have become widespread. The most troublesome species are buckthorn and garlic mustard. Power lines are a continual problem because of the aggressive vegetation management practices used by the utility company. The railroad severely altered the wetland flowage when the rail link was constructed over 75 years ago. Current vegetation includes the natural habitats and planted prairies, oldfield and turf.


Ongoing vegetation management activities include buckthorn removal and prescribed burns of the planted prairie. Invasive species, especially black locust, are controlled on a variety of habitats with herbicides and bio-control. The bio-control efforts are done in partnership with the Minnesota Department of Agriculture and the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources. The oak woods are being managed to contain and control oak wilt.

Wetlands/Ground Water

Storm water management was designed to reduce runoff into wetlands. Ramsey County works with Rice Creek Watershed District to reduce run off. All appropriate erosion prevention measures are taken during development projects. Ground water protection measures include the sealing of all wells during redevelopment. All facilities are connected to sanitary sewer.



Wildlife

The park hosts a diverse variety of wildlife. The park has a variety of nesting songbirds, waterfowl and raptors. Nest boxes are provided for wood ducks and eastern bluebirds. Larger mammals include white-tailed deer, coyotes, red fox and raccoons. There are no threatened or endangered species of plants or animals located in the park.


Deer populations are annually surveyed. If needed, the deer herd will be managed with special hunts under the Ramsey County Cooperative Deer Management Plan in partnership with Arden Hills.

The Canada goose population is marginally controlled through lake shoreline management and periodic removal of birds prior to flight. Migratory birds have no natural predators and continue to pose a sanitation problem.

Minnesota Ecological Classification

Tony Schmidt Regional Park is mainly within the St. Paul-Baldwin Plains subsection of the Minnesota Ecological Classification System. There is a small portion of the park on the western and southwestern edges that fall into the Anoka Sand Plain subsection. The following map illustrates the Minnesota ecological regional subsections for Tony Schmidt Regional Park.


